Gay's million-dollar drinking water & sewer update?

Well, the story about the drinking-water supply in Gay has a deep history and high costs. Back in 1901, the residents of Gay needed a water supply and the mining operations needed a substantial supply of water to operate the steam plant. The resolution was to take water from Lake Superior, one of the purest and most abundant sources in the world. Pipes carried water to Gay, but this meant annual repairs from ice damage. In 1920, the company's miners hand-dug a 2,700-foot tunnel under the lake to access the water.

In the 1980s, a new \$80,000 water treatment system was built so that water coming from the lake tunnel passed through sand filters to remove particles, and it was treated with chlorine to kill harmful bacteria. However, after nearly 100 years, the tunnel began to collapse and the water entering it became dominated by ground water rather lake water. Unfortunately, ground water brought along a uranium pollution problem that caused the water to

no longer meet federal and state drinking water-quality standards.

A new water supply was needed and in 2006 the system was completed, using

Straight from the Board: Township is selling the old water-treatment plant property!

The Township will sell the old water treatment plant property and building. The 0.46 acre parcel is located next to the Tobacco River and includes both river front and lake view property. It has a driveway and electrical service. Both the property and buildings are being sold "as is" by sealed bid, due July 31, 2012. The Board of Trustees will select the purchasing bid at the regular meeting, August 9. The Board reserves the right to refuse any and all bids.

Throughout the winter, members of our fire department have been conducting regular monthly meetings and performing routine preventative maintenance to ensure serviceability of our equipment and apparatus.

This spring, we took our tanker / brush truck out of winter storage. As the summer months approach, everyone is busy cleaning up limbs and brush left by winter snows. We would like to remind everyone that you can obtain burning permits

Please use caution if you intend to burn debris. Since the snowmelt, we have had very dry conditions, which dramatically increases the possibility of serious wildland fires.

Our thanks go to the newest member of the VFD, Art Niebzidoski. Art successfully completed Firefighter I training over the winter. Art brings our total strength up to 11 members, 8 of which are now qualified to enter a fire scene to attack the fire and rescue anyone who may become trapped.

We continue to look for more applicants to join us in keeping the residents of Sherman Township safe. Anyone interested can contact the Sherman Township Board of Trustees for more information.

We also need volunteers to assist us with our fourth of July fundraiser. Our only means of raising operating funds for the VFD is through hot dog and refreshment sales during and after the parade. Township Roadside Litter Cleanup



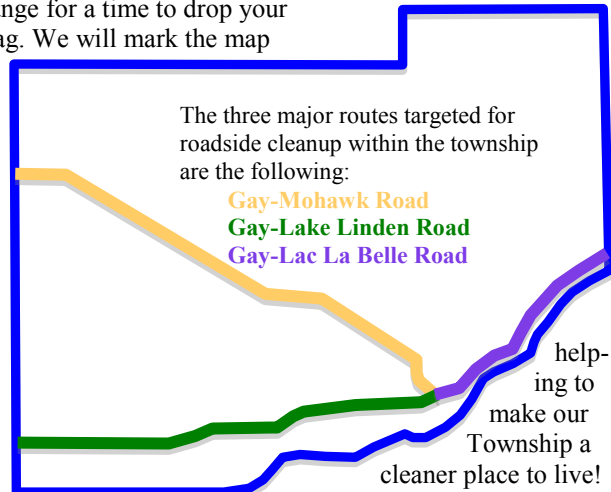
For the Township Roadside Cleanup!

wells to pump ground water that met drinking water standards, and included a new distribution system with flow pumps, a supply storage tank, and pressure tanks. With the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development grant of \$406,845 and a low interest rate on a loan, the Township kept the costs to a minimum for the residents of Gay. Enjoy the clean, fresh water and all the work that went



into completing a new, modern water supply system!

Drinking-Water Supply System Fun or Not-so Fun Facts!

- Provides water to 84 parcels within Gay
- Project cost totaled \$585,185
- US Government paid \$477,845, or 70%, of the cost
- Gay residents used a \$178,340 Federal loan to pay the remaining 30%
- Cost per parcel was \$6,966 but the cost to parcel owner was only \$2,123
- As of 2012, residents owed \$160,000 on the Federal 40-year loan



The original 1920's open-pipe sewer system basically routed raw sewage from households into a wetland just outside of Gay without any sort of treatment or filtration of solids. As you can imagine, there were times during heavy rain storms that sewage made it's way back to town with floating debris such as toilet paper and, well, you can guess what else.

Okay, you get the picture and the situation had to change. So a new sewer system was built in 2002 to treat the sewage as required by federal and state water-quality regulations. The cost was high — systems are not cheap to build. The new sewage system uses biological activity, or bacteria, in an underground tank to breakdown waste products, going through a three stage process, and the "treated" water is then released. The remaining solids need to be pumped out every few years.



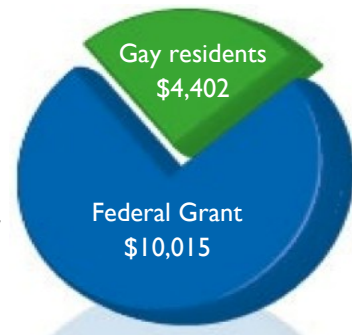
Sewage Treatment System Fun or Not-so Fun Facts!

- Serves 68 parcels within Gay
- Project cost totaled \$506,700
- US Government paid \$351,700, or 70% of the cost
- Gay residents used a \$155,000 Federal loan to pay the remaining cost
- Total cost per parcel was \$7,451, but parcel owners pay only \$2,279
- As of 2012, residents still owed \$124,500 on the Federal 40-year loan

So are the new systems worth the cost? That is always difficult to answer in a small community where few people share the burden. If you compare the cost to parcel owners, \$4,402 for both systems combined, it is a good deal compared to the cost of a private well (often \$5,000 to \$8,000 depending on depth) and a private septic system (\$4,000 to over \$10,000 depending of if it requires lift stations and an artificial drain field). Private wells and septic systems do not have Federal grants that pay 70% of the cost! All things considered, the residents of Gay got a good deal as they only paid 30 cents on the dollar for a system that should provide great service for decades to come.
